

South Carolina and Immigration



- South Carolina is a new receiving area
- Immigrant labor growing rapidly
- Little understood effects on the economy







The Economic Forces

- Pulling force: Employment opportunities in U.S and South Carolina.
- Pushing force: Declining opportunities in Latin America
- Sustaining forces
 - Highly productive and profitable
 - Ample supply

The Data Sources

- Census and American Community Survey
 - Published data
 - Unpublished data computed from microdata sets

- USC Survey of Latinos in South Carolina
 - Interviews conducted by Spanish-speaking individuals
 - Interviews were conducted anonymously





The USC Survey

- conducted in the fall of 2006
- participants were given a 10 dollar Wal-Mart card
- had a total of 52 questions
- The teams consisted of Graduate level business students proficient in Spanish
- conducted at the Mexican consulates as well as other areas like the flea market and a healthcare Latino conference





The Survey Questions:

- You and your family
 - Gender, age, marital status, schooling, etc
- Your employment
 - Earnings, type, amount of work, injuries, etc
- Your spending
 - Remittances, savings, banking, driving, etc
- Your household
 - Type, composition, etc
- Health issues and other services
 - Status, insurance, food stamps, etc.



Growing Latino Population in South Carolina



- Latino Population
 - U.S. Census estimates 135,000 for 2005 (3.2% of total population)
 - Increased 350% from 2000 to 2005 (87% in the nation as a whole)
 - Current growth rates would increase Latino population to 400,000 by 2009
 - The Census numbers are probably underestimating the actual values




Characteristics of the South Carolina Latino Population



- 62% are Mexican
- males 56% (ACS) vs 65% (Survey)
- Average stay: 7.9 yrs (US) vs 4.8 yrs (SC)
- 68% live with non-immediate family
- 41 percent shared a residence with a roommate, acquaintance or friend
- household size averaged 5.1
- Foreign born: 57% (ACS) vs 97% (Survey)
- Do not speak English: 37% (ACS) vs (50%+25%)










Average Age by Industry

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



Employee Benefits

- only 46.8 percent said the employer offered health insurance to the worker
- of those offered coverage only 58.3 percent opted to take the group insurance.
- 29 percent reported being offered other benefits (65 percent opted to take the benefit)
- 42 percent of Latino respondents received workplace safety information in Spanish.
- About 15 percent of respondents reported being injured on the job
- About 70 percent said that the employer paid for workplace injury medical expenses, and 61 percent reported that the employer paid lost wages for time missed as well.


South Carolina: Poverty Status 2006 (American Community Survey)



South Carolina Percentage of Food Stamp Recipients by Race/Ethnicity, May 2007





What did we learn about the South Carolina Latino Population?



- This a diverse and hard to stereotype population
- Most are young and male
- Most are low skilled, low-educated and low-income
- Attracted to employment opportunities and family networks
- Most do not have health-care but they do not seem to be burdening the health care system
- Poverty rate for Latinos is similar to that of African-Americans
- For each of the three largest sectors with a Latino work force in South Carolina, African-Americans either lost jobs, saw earnings decline, or both.
- Industries with increased presence of Latinos had real wage declines.
