#### **Overview**

Falls from height remain a concern in construction, particularly for foreign-born Latino construction workers employed by small residential contractors. Researchers conducted five focus groups and thirteen in-depth interviews with workers, small residential contractors, and key informants in San Francisco and Philadelphia in order to identify individual and contextual factors influencing fall risk.

### **Key Findings**

Economic conditions in residential construction, coupled with a lack of enforcement and vulnerabilities of the foreign-born workforce, are principal contributors to risk for falls.

Small contractors perceive strong economic disincentives for implementation of fall protection, and foreign-born Latino workers experience a variety of social, cultural and occupational pressures impeding its use.

Increased adoption of fall protection cannot be accomplished solely by targeting Latino construction workers. Research is needed on incentives to influence contractor behavior and facilitate adoption of fall protection measures.
